SURVEILLANCE GRID -- Presented by Warren Hackbarth

(Note: the proposal brochure was included in the Annual Member Mailing.)

The presenter explained that Surveillance Grid (SG) integrates existing systems, identified the surveillance reasons, suggested solutions and explained the system installation. Current SG users include Quail Lodge, The Park Lane, Del Rey Oaks, and others. He noted that cameras are important in identifying vehicles and people to assist law enforcement and increase conviction by 400%.

For Carmel Views and Rio Vista, a camera would be installed on the light pole at the entrance to capture license plates. If internet access would be desired, the system would connect via T-Mobile.

Questions raised by attending members and answered by the presenter: Who monitors the cameras?

Unmonitored unless an incident required access.

Who follows up with inquiries about illegal activities? *Volunteer members or Surveillance Grid personnel.*

Why is the system needed; what is the problem it solves?

Burglary, home invasion, auto break-ins, arson, preventative.

Are licenses of all residents, guests and tradesmen recorded in a Data base?

Residents can either register their license or opt out of surveillance.

Is the license data secured?

Accessible only by CVCA Board and any permitted entities.

Are permits required to put camera on the pole?

PG&E owns the pole and permission is required.

Does law enforcement have access to the system? Only if CVCA grants permission to access.

What is the cost for each of the 312 Carmel Views and Rio Vista Homeowners? The one-time Installation cost is \$33.60 and the annual fee \$7.15.

The Board will discuss Camera Surveillance at our next meeting and, providing there is sufficient interest, The Board will submit a proposal to members.

CARMEL VIEWS FIREWISE -- Presented by Liz Chornesky

Firewise was founded in 2021 to reduce fire risks in our high-risk fire area. It is run by association member volunteers and is recognized and certified by the National Firewise Program and approved by CalFire.

Tremendous progress has been made during the last four years. Firefighters are aware we are serious about fire prevention. A large portion of our budget comes from external funding. Firewise Certificates are available to homeowners.

In November the CVCA Board met with four CalFire officers who concluded that Cal Am's Water Tank Road in upper Carmel Views was a better option that the unimproved extension of Outlook Drive. CalFire has obtained gate access and CalAm has granted road access. Now the road needs improvements to be a safe and viable Emergency Fire Exit. An unidentified Association Member asked the Board to provide a map of all the CVCA Emergency Fire Exit when the Exit Plan is complete and the road is improved.



LIVING IN A FIREWISE COMMUNITY

Firewise recognition identifies Carmel Views as a community whose members are working hard – individually and collectively – to reduce wildfire risks. It provides access to discounted homeowner's insurance rates, signals firefighters that our community will be more defensible during wildfire events and improves our ability to secure grant funding.

Our Firewise recognition is granted by the National Firewise Program and approved by CalFire. It is based on our community implementing a 3-year Action Plan informed by an assessment of community wildfire risks. Each year, we submit a report to the national program summarizing our community's accomplishments to maintain certification of our Firewise recognition.

CARMEL VIEWS' NEW ACTION PLAN (2024-2027)

Our 2024 Community Risk Assessment Survey (85 respondents) showed:

- · Good understanding of wildfire risks
- Almost everyone is creating defensible space within 30' of homes, but less attention out to 100', and neighbors are worried
- · Increasing attention to home hardening, but many vulnerabilities remain

The new Action Plan prioritizes:

- · Continuing dissemination of information & resources to community
- · Spurring action by homeowners who have not yet engaged
- Managing fuel breaks & loads in common areas
- Improving emergency evacuation options
- · Spurring action by adjacent owners of forested areas and wildlands

WHAT YOU CAN DO!

- We all live in the WUI (the "wildland-urban interface") in an area designated at a "HIGH fire hazard severity zone" by the State Fire Marshal.
- Create defensible space out to 100' away from your home according to CalFire guidance (https://readyforwildfire.org/prepare-for-wildfire/defensible-space/) and in accord with State laws (https://readyforwildfire.org/fire-safety-laws/).
- Harden your home through low-cost retrofits. Use of WUI products for larger projects will reduce potential ignitions (https://www.fire.ca.gov/home-hardening).
- Know our evacuation routes and sign up for emergency alerts (https://www.readymontereycounty.org/prepare/stay-informed).
- Read the Fire Preparedness Update emails and respond to Firewise information requests!
- And VOLUNTEER!
